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1 MS. PRESSLEY: Thank you all for  
2 joining us today. Good afternoon. My name is Denay  
3 Pressley and we're going to call the meeting to  
4 order.

5 This is a formal meeting of the Public  
6 Health Council. Adequate notice of this meeting has  
7 been published in accordance with the provisions of  
8 Chapter 231 Public Law 1975C-10:4.10 of the State of  
9 New Jersey entitled Open Public Meetings Act.

10 Notice was sent to the Secretary of  
11 State who posted the notice in a public place.  
12 Notice was also provided electronically on the  
13 department's website and meeting dates has been  
14 published on two of the New Jersey papers.

15 I will now call the roll.

16 Ms. Stephanie Carey.

17 MS. CAREY: Here.

18 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Paul Roman.

19 MR. ROMAN: Yes.

20 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Michael Gross.  
21 Mickey.

22 MR. GROSS: Can you hear me. Mickey  
23 Gross, I'm here.

24 MS. PRESSLEY: Thank you.

25 MR. GROSS: Merry Christmas, everyone.

1 MS. PRESSLEY: And Dr. Suffiyah Webb.

2 DR. WEBB: I'M here.

3 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you. We  
4 have four members of the council present which does  
5 constitute a quorum.

6 For the transcription purposes, please  
7 announce your full name each time before speaking.

8 Please mute your microphones during the call.

9 Greatly appreciate it, and I will now let the other  
10 members in. You may proceed.

11 MS. CAREY: Thank you. I'd like to  
12 welcome everybody who is attending today and for  
13 your ability to be here for this specially scheduled  
14 meeting.

15 We are in a major change for the field  
16 of public health in this point in time. We have a  
17 new governor with new focus areas.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Has the meeting  
19 started? I'm a new person to the quorum and it's  
20 very confusing. I'm in the waiting room but it  
21 seems like you guys are continuing without letting  
22 me in virtually and I keep asking for that.

23 Before you continue with the agenda,  
24 can you let me in on the meeting on Teams, please.

25 A number of people. Roll call, I don't even know

1 who matches this name.

2 MS. CAREY: Pardon me. Who's this?

3 MS. PRESSLEY: What number is that?

4 I'm letting them in now, but I would definitely let  
5 you in.

6 We have to proceed with the meeting.

7 I'm doing that now. What number are you calling  
8 from? What's the last four digits of your number.

9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 1281, yeah.

10 MS. PRESSLEY: I'm going to have to  
11 mute you because you can't interrupt the meeting.

12 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's fine.  
13 I'm confused if the meeting has started. You're not  
14 letting me in.

15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm in the same  
16 position.

17 MS. PRESSLEY: We will let them in.  
18 Please mute your mic, okay, and we will let them in  
19 now.

20 MS. CAREY: May I proceed with opening  
21 comments?

22 MS. PRESSLEY: Yes, please proceed.

23 MS. CAREY: All right. I want to  
24 welcome everybody who's taken time out of their day  
25 to be here today. We are in a period of rapid

1 change. There's a new governor coming on board, a  
2 new administration. Federal guidance is in flux and  
3 indeed the change is so rapid that it feels like  
4 many long-standing accepted public health practices  
5 and sciences are being left behind in a whirlwind of  
6 activity.

7                   And at this point in time, it's more  
8 important than ever to amplify the voice of public  
9 health and to partner with people who value public  
10 health with the objective of protecting the health  
11 of the people of New Jersey and saving lives,  
12 because that's what we're here for.

13                   So that ends my opening statement and  
14 I will ask for the next agenda item, which is  
15 approval of the previous meeting's minutes of  
16 September 8th, 2025.

17                   Do I have a motion for approval of the  
18 minutes?

19                   MR. ROMAN: Which meeting minutes are  
20 we looking at or supposed to be looking at?

21                   MS. CAREY: September 8th.

22                   MR. ROMAN: September. I don't have  
23 them.

24                   MS. PRESSLEY: They were sent in the  
25 email, Paul.

1 MS. CAREY: Yes, the December 17th  
2 email.

3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm part of the  
4 public. I hate to interrupt, but we're still not  
5 being let in online.

6 MS. PRESSLEY: I'm going to interrupt  
7 you for one second, Stephanie.

8 I'm not sure why you're not -- the  
9 log-in has been cleared so if you're calling in I'm  
10 not sure what you mean you're not part of the  
11 meeting because we hear you interrupting the  
12 meeting.

13 DR. SAHU: I think the meeting link on  
14 the agenda is leading to the wrong place so maybe we  
15 need to post the correct meeting link. That way  
16 folks can actually get into this meeting.

17 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That wouldn't  
19 be fair to the public.

20 MS. PRESSLEY: I'm sorry, Dr. Sahu,  
21 you're really low. I couldn't hear you.

22 DR. SAHU: I think the meeting link  
23 that went out on the agenda is not leading to this  
24 meeting. It's leading to somewhere else, and that's  
25 what folks are stuck in.

1 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. So you're saying  
2 that the meeting that was in the agenda is  
3 incorrect? Probably because I'm in this room, then.

4 DR. SAHU: In the hyperlink, the Join  
5 Meeting Now hyperlink on the agenda I think points  
6 to the October meeting, not to this meeting.

7 So we should probably repost, if we  
8 can do that on the site, or repost the link to this  
9 meeting so that way folks can actually join this  
10 one.

11 The meeting ID and the dial in number  
12 are all correct, but the actual hyperlink for Join  
13 Meeting Now I think points to a different meeting.

14 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. Let me see if I  
15 can put that in really quick.

16 Okay. I'm going to drop it in the  
17 chat and let me know.

18 DR. SAHU: The folks on the phone  
19 probably won't be able to access the chat, though,  
20 so we may need to post the new hyperlink on the  
21 website so folks can actually go in like that.

22 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. That would be  
23 great.

24 DR. SAHU: Dr. (Indiscernible) going  
25 to go in and post the updated link. I'm just not

1 sure everybody can see it because they can't see the  
2 other meeting as well. But we should still post it  
3 on our website, the updated meeting link, so folks  
4 can access it.

5 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. I will do that  
6 now.

7 Stephanie, do you want to do the roll  
8 call and I'll just keep that on so we can keep this  
9 going.

10 Did someone accept the meeting  
11 minutes?

12 MS. CAREY: Yes. I will call for a  
13 motion to approve the previous meeting minutes from  
14 September 8th, 2025.

15 DR. WEBB: Suffiyah Webb, I make a  
16 motion to approve those minutes.

17 MS. CAREY: Dr. Webb, thank you.

18 And do I have a second for that?

19 Mr. Gross perhaps?

20 MS. PRESSLEY: would someone second  
21 the minutes?

22 MS. CAREY: Point of order, I believe  
23 the chair can second but not make the initial  
24 motion, is that --

25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes, that's

1 fine.

2 MS. CAREY: So I will second the  
3 motion.

4 And may I have a roll call, please.

5 MS. PRESSLEY: Ms. Stephanie Carey.

6 MS. CAREY: Yes.

7 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Paul Roman.

8 MR. ROMAN: Abstain.

9 MS. PRESSLEY: Michael Gross. Mickey  
10 Gross.

11 Dr. Suffiyah Webb.

12 DR. WEBB: Yes.

13 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. We have three.  
14 Motion fails at this point. I can't get Mickey.

15 MS. CAREY: Okay. So noted. We can  
16 put that on the January agenda.

17 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay, and I'm posting  
18 this now for everyone to get to.

19 MR. ROMAN: Madam Chair.

20 MS. CAREY: Yes, Mr. Roman.

21 MR. ROMAN: I'm asking that the  
22 minutes from the August 18th meeting and the  
23 September 8th meeting please be sent out to us, at  
24 least to me. I do not have them. I never received  
25 them.

1 MS. CAREY: So noted.

2 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. Stephanie, do  
3 you want to proceed with the chairperson's report?

4 MS. CAREY: Yes, I will make some -- a  
5 couple of brief comments.

6 Looking at the old business and  
7 today's agenda, there are important things going on.  
8 The transition of administration, developing budget  
9 recommendations, addressing public health staffing  
10 infrastructure, collaborations across multiple  
11 states, but the most important thing we need to work  
12 on today is the readoption of the communicable  
13 disease standards, N.J.A.C. 8:57.

14 So understanding if we speak briefly  
15 today on some of these other items so that we can  
16 focus on 857, understand that these items are not  
17 being given short shrift or being tabled but that we  
18 need to focus on the communicable disease rules  
19 today.

20 That said, I would be prepared to go  
21 on to some of the old business. If there are -- and  
22 then with comments from the board later on the  
23 agenda.

24 Under old business, New Jersey is part  
25 of the northeast public health collaborative, a

1 multistate effort to assure sound public health  
2 policy at state levels.

3 Dr. Sahu, I didn't know if you wanted  
4 to provide additional comments on that at this point  
5 or whether you would like to table that at this  
6 point in time.

7 DR. SAHU: Thanks, Stephanie. Yeah, I  
8 can make a brief comment that we are partnering with  
9 other northeast states in coming up with things like  
10 clinical guidance and documents that we can align  
11 with, and I think really the goal is that so there  
12 isn't dramatic variation when a person goes from New  
13 York to New Jersey to Rhode Island and things like  
14 that, and so I'll just leave those comments brief  
15 but I think it's a pretty fruitful collaboration  
16 between the northeast states right now.

17 MS. CAREY: Thank you. And more  
18 important than ever.

19 we also shared a one-pager for the  
20 transition team on the role of the Public Health  
21 Council, in particular its role as an advisor to the  
22 commission -- to the commissioner, pardon me, to  
23 amplify the voice of public health, to encourage and  
24 support sound policy decisions and to serve as a  
25 conduit of community feedback, community

1 temperature, let us say, to serve as a conduit for  
2 that kind of input to the state health department,  
3 and that the Public Health Council is analogous to  
4 advisory boards of health, to local health agencies  
5 all over the state. We provide a voice. We provide  
6 guidance and we provide expertise and the wisdom of  
7 our many years of experience to protect the health  
8 of our communities.

9 So as I said, and the document also  
10 contains information on the structure of the Public  
11 Health Council, and the levels of appointment, we  
12 currently have five appointed members out of an  
13 approved board of ten. So we have vacancies that do  
14 need to be filled.

15 we're looking forward to continuing to  
16 build on these positive efforts and to help make an  
17 impact on improving the health of New Jerseyans.

18 MR. ROMAN: Madam Chair.

19 MS. CAREY: Yes, Mr. Roman.

20 MR. ROMAN: To whom is this document  
21 going? I think it's well written but it doesn't say  
22 anything that we want. It's not a wish list, it's  
23 just a tutorial on who we are, and that's fine.

24 MS. CAREY: Yes.

25 MR. ROMAN: But I think the main thing

1 is to say what we want, not who we are, and where is  
2 it going?

3 MS. CAREY: This particular document  
4 is for orientation purposes for incoming appointees  
5 and administration members to understand the purpose  
6 of the Public Health Council and then the follow-on  
7 is our white papers, briefing papers from our  
8 committee work.

9 MR. ROMAN: Okay. The reason I ask is  
10 because the governor has appointed a transition  
11 committee as part of her team and there's only one  
12 that has any reference to health at all, and that's  
13 dealing with health care and particularly health  
14 care issues with Washington.

15 There are two former commissioners of  
16 health on that committee and also a lady who was the  
17 head or one of the heads of the CMS in Washington,  
18 but -- and there's somebody from the Quality  
19 Institute in Jersey, but I'm hoping this paper and  
20 maybe a support document, like a wish list, would go  
21 to those people.

22 MS. CAREY: Thank you. I will follow  
23 up on that.

24 Dr. Sahu, did you have any messaging  
25 that you wanted to share at this point?

1 DR. SAHU: I think we're -- a few key  
2 leaders from New Jersey Department of Health had met  
3 with the transition team so far just to kind of talk  
4 about the Department of Health in general, and so  
5 we're happy to kind of still funnel or route  
6 anything from the Public Health Council both to the  
7 current administration but also to the current  
8 administration to help with transition.

9 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

10 Let's see. At this point in time, I  
11 don't have any specific feedback on the upcoming New  
12 Jersey process but we hope to be engaged with  
13 recommendations and support in the coming weeks.

14 And then the last outstanding item of  
15 old business for the -- the last item of old  
16 business was regarding access to pediatric vaccines  
17 and with the concern being with changing  
18 recommendations and confusion amongst parents and  
19 providers that there continue to be publicly  
20 available vaccines in order to meet the needs of the  
21 youngest New Jerseyans, and when they made -- when  
22 parents may have difficulty locating vaccines in  
23 their community for their young children, and I know  
24 there's been some specific statewide efforts on  
25 that.

1                   Again, Dr. Sahu, did you have anything  
2                   you wanted to summarize based on that?

3                   DR. SAHU: Sure. I'll summarize a  
4                   couple points. One is that with regards to vaccines  
5                   for the respiratory virus season, we've used some  
6                   state money to purchase directly vaccines to then  
7                   supply to health systems to run clinics both in the  
8                   north and south, southern parts of Jersey to help  
9                   kind of bridge some of the access issues; and then  
10                  the other thing I'll mention is that at the recent  
11                  ACIP meeting they had voted to change some of the  
12                  requirements on Hepatitis B, and so in response New  
13                  Jersey Department of Health issued an executive  
14                  directive continuing to support the birth dose for  
15                  Hepatitis B as well as the childhood schedule for  
16                  Hepatitis B, and DOBI and Medicaid have both  
17                  followed up in New Jersey with companion documents  
18                  to support coverage for those things as well.  
19                  Thanks.

20                  MS. CAREY: Thank you.

21                  All right. One additional item of old  
22                  business, Mr. Roman, there's been some actions to  
23                  improve enforcement and inspection of tobacco and  
24                  vape establishments. Did you want to provide any  
25                  kind of --

1 MR. ROMAN: Yeah. Give me two  
2 seconds, I'll get the paper. Hold on.

3 MS. CAREY: Okay. All right. New  
4 Jersey again to improve the health of the  
5 communities has policies in place and pending action  
6 on initiatives to reduce use access to tobacco and  
7 vape and to increase inspection of establishments  
8 that sell those products.

9 MR. ROMAN: Yeah. There's three sets  
10 of bills that have been put forth by the  
11 legislature. A1813 and S3372 prohibit delivery of  
12 tobacco and vapor products to individuals under 21.

13 They passed the Senate yesterday,  
14 which was Thursday of this week, and now awaits  
15 Governor Murphy's signature.

16 There was a submission by a coalition  
17 that's working on all this to request a swift  
18 signing. That was just put in this morning.

19 Second group. A3992, S4828 increases  
20 the penalties for the unlawful sale of tobacco and  
21 vapor products to persons under 21.

22 The Assembly bill passed. The  
23 Assembly majority office issued this press release  
24 incorporating language we provided, this coalition.

25 The bill enhancing penalties for

1 selling tobacco and vaping products to youth  
2 advances. That's that one.

3 And the S bill 4828 is working with  
4 Senator Vitale and Senate President Scutari to post  
5 to the January 8th Senate budget committee or move  
6 directly to the Senate floor. That's the second  
7 group.

8 Third group, A2388, S3644 requires  
9 more frequent inspections to tobacco and vaping  
10 retailers. The Assembly bill is being worked on to  
11 secure an agenda spot in January, Assembly  
12 Appropriations Committee hearing if it's scheduled,  
13 and the Senate bill that they're working to get a  
14 January 8th Senate Budget Assembly Committee agenda.

15 One of these bills, I think it's that  
16 one, calls for increased enforcement, or one of  
17 these three bills, and there's a group trying to get  
18 an amendment to put money forth for the additional  
19 inspections by health departments because it's like  
20 an unfunded mandate if these things pass and there's  
21 no money put forward for the additional inspections.

22 So the group that's advocating all  
23 these bills, especially the health department folks  
24 and our local boards of health group, are pushing to  
25 get money put in there so it's not just an unfunded

1 mandate.

2 That's it. There's a lady who is --  
3 Karla Pollack who is from one of the advocacy  
4 groups, she is a licensed lobbyist and advocate and  
5 she is one of the people that's leading the charge  
6 for these bills.

7 MS. CAREY: Okay. Thank you.

8 Let's see. If there are no other  
9 items of old business, we can move on to new  
10 business, which is the Notice of Adoption of  
11 N.J.A.C. 8:57 with a presentation by --

12 MS. PRESSLEY: Stephanie, I'm sorry.  
13 Can you give me one second? I just want to make  
14 sure, because I switched everything over, I just  
15 want to make sure that everyone that wants to be in  
16 the meeting, I think I got everyone. I'm still  
17 letting some in. I just want to make sure.

18 MS. CAREY: Okay. I will pause for a  
19 moment and --

20 MS. PRESSLEY: Is anyone --

21 MS. CAREY: -- until you're ready to  
22 proceed.

23 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you,  
24 Stephanie.

25 Is anyone having trouble now? I think

1 I pretty much let everyone in who was in the lobby.

2 Okay. I think I have everyone now. I  
3 just wanted to make sure before you proceed.

4 Okay. Go ahead, Stephanie.

5 MS. CAREY: Okay. Thank you.

6 MS. PRESSLEY: Thank you.

7 MS. CAREY: All right. Mr. David  
8 Sellinger, you are presenting on behalf of the  
9 Department of Health?

10 MR. SELLINGER: Yes, I am. Confirming  
11 you can hear me.

12 MS. CAREY: Yes.

13 MR. SELLINGER: I'll get started then.

14 Good afternoon, everyone. My name's  
15 David Sellinger. I'm an executive assistant within  
16 the Department of Health's Division of Epidemiology,  
17 Environmental and Occupational Health.

18 I'm here to present the Notice of  
19 Adoption for N.J.A.C. 8:57, and joining me are  
20 several subject matter experts.

21 We have Dr. Edward Lifshitz, Kim  
22 Cervantes and Darby McDermott from the Communicable  
23 Disease Service's Infectious and Zoonotic Disease  
24 Program.

25 Dr. Barbara Montana, Jenish Sudhakaran

1 and Jill Dinitz-Sklar from the Communicable Disease  
2 Service's Vaccine Preventable Disease Program.

3 And Assistant Commissioner Greta  
4 Anschuetz and Monica Beshay from the Division of  
5 HIV, STD and TB Services.

6 During the comment period the  
7 department received approximately 2,686 submissions.  
8 This resulted in 463 unique comments from over 811  
9 commenters. These included supportive comments from  
10 the Medical Society of New Jersey, the New Jersey  
11 Association for Biomedical Research, BioNJ, the New  
12 Jersey Health Care Quality Institute, the Health  
13 Care Institute of New Jersey, the New Jersey  
14 Pharmacists Association and the New Jersey College  
15 Health Association, among others.

16 These comments included many questions  
17 and clarifications on various topics proposed by the  
18 rule, including 12 template letters that were sent  
19 in by numerous commenters. A full list of these  
20 comments and department responses is included within  
21 the Notice of Adoption.

22 Two amendments were made to the rule  
23 text since proposed. Under the communicable  
24 disease, infection and condition reported  
25 requirements established under 8.57-2.3(b), the text

1 rabies and rabies PEP administration was amended to  
2 require reporting of rabies exposures and PEP  
3 administration.

4 In the summary of the rule included  
5 within the initial Notice of Proposal, it was stated  
6 that this was intended to read rabies exposures, but  
7 the word exposures was omitted from the rule text.

8 This created a duplicative reporting  
9 requirement with the existing requirement to report  
10 rabies immediately under proposed 2.3(a). As the  
11 department and commenters noted the exclusion of the  
12 word exposure, this omission will be corrected upon  
13 adoption.

14 For the second amendment, the  
15 department is deleting the requirement for  
16 laboratories to submit negative results for  
17 influenza and Sars-CoV-2 that was under  
18 8:57-2.6(a)4.

19 The purpose of requesting these  
20 negative reports on proposal was to determine  
21 positivity rates. However, the number of results  
22 that we would receive would be exceptionally  
23 burdensome on our systems, and we are now also able  
24 to access national positivity data from CDC's  
25 ESSENCE platform.

1                   we've also made amendments to three  
2                   appendices.

3                   Appendix L, our Request for Medical  
4                   Exemption from Mandatory Immunization, was amended  
5                   to reference AAP, ACP, AAFP and ACOG in addition to  
6                   ACIP. We removed the table reference to specific  
7                   ACIP contraindications and replaced with a table for  
8                   providers to check each applicable vaccine for which  
9                   a medical exemption is requested and the length of  
10                  time for that contraindication or precaution.

11                  Appendix Q, our Annual College  
12                  Immunization Status Report, was amended in response  
13                  to a comment to remove reference to specify that the  
14                  two-dose MenACWY field is only required if the  
15                  information is available.

16                  Additionally, the Meningococcal B  
17                  vaccine was removed under Section C and to include  
18                  it as an additional vaccine under Section E.

19                  Appendix X, our Meningococcal Disease  
20                  Information Brochure was updated to modernize, to  
21                  improve readability, and to include reference to the  
22                  rules as proposed.

23                  This concludes my presentation. We  
24                  look forward to any questions. Thank you.

25                  MS. CAREY: Thank you, Mr. Sellinger.

1 I will open first for questions and  
2 comments from council members.

3 MR. ROMAN: I'd like to start.

4 MS. CAREY: Yes, Mr. Roman.

5 MR. ROMAN: Mr. Sellinger, and I guess  
6 Ms. Raganelli, is she on the call? I understand she  
7 was or is.

8 On the 30th of October, I wrote an  
9 email letter to Ms. Raganelli. I'm going to read  
10 that because it's difficult to explain it without  
11 just reading it. It's not that long.

12 MS. RAGANELLI: Mr. Roman, I have your  
13 letter in front of me and I can answer each one of  
14 your points without you reading it.

15 Your first point was we didn't define  
16 the term local board of health, we didn't define the  
17 term Local Board of Health because we don't use the  
18 term Local Board of Health in the rule text, and I  
19 said to you at the time that it's not OAL style to  
20 define words that we don't use in N.J.A.C. 8:57.

21 In fact, we did define the word Local  
22 Health Agency by reference to the statutory  
23 definition of that term at 26:2(k), I believe it  
24 was.

25 The second comment -- but there is a

1 definition of the statutory term Local Health  
2 Agency.

3 The next question you had is with  
4 respect to pages 155 and 156. You said we referred  
5 to the definition of a Local Health Department as  
6 meaning a Local Board of Health.

7 At the time we didn't see that you had  
8 been noticed that that was in a section of bracketed  
9 text marked for deletion. So that text, I'm looking  
10 at the proposal right now, and the text to which you  
11 were referring at pages 155 and 156 was existing  
12 text that we were proposing for deletion.

13 Your point three was with respect to  
14 pages 176 and 177, and you were identifying your  
15 support of the proposed new rule at 1.8, and we  
16 acknowledged your support of that.

17 Your fourth point was with respect to  
18 pages 225 and 226. You were referring to a  
19 reference to Appendix B that should have been  
20 relabeled to be Appendix R.

21 Again, you were referring to deleted  
22 text that was marked for deletion. There was a  
23 bracket above it and a bracket on the following page  
24 below it that it was hard to see because there was a  
25 paragraph above and a paragraph below, but that's

1 the OAL code style is you put the bracket where the  
2 text starts the deletion and at the end even if it's  
3 several paragraphs later.

4           And then on page 225, you asked for an  
5 insertion to include cautionary information to EMS  
6 and law enforcement regarding their contact and  
7 transport of quarantined and isolated individuals,  
8 and at the time I said to you we would want to do  
9 that in a thoroughly thought out and considered  
10 manner, and I'm not the person that can agree or  
11 disagree to make such a change. That would be  
12 something we would talk to our Office of Emergency  
13 Medical Services personnel, and also that is a model  
14 ordinance; it's not binding on anybody until a local  
15 municipality elected to enact it.

16           However, we did acknowledge at the  
17 time that that was something that we would put to  
18 our Office of Emergency Medical Services personnel.  
19 I did not agree at the time, and I did say at the  
20 time we will take that under advisement and give it  
21 a thorough rule, and you were pleased with that.

22           But again, I even have the transcript  
23 in front of me where you acknowledge that at least  
24 one of the points that you made was with reference  
25 to deleted text, and I acknowledge that you don't

1 have the transcript in front of you, but I was very  
2 careful to review your letter, sir, and I did look  
3 at each of those points and I don't think I missed  
4 anything, and I completely appreciated your input  
5 and we are grateful for it, sir, and there was no  
6 disrespect intended.

7 I didn't take it as a formal comment  
8 on the rule because it was not submitted through the  
9 rule making portal and the -- I took it as just a  
10 simple communication between you and me. I didn't  
11 take it as a formal comment on the rule.

12 Thank you, Mr. Roman.

13 MR. ROMAN: My turn?

14 MS. RAGANELLI: Yes, sir.

15 MR. ROMAN: Good. Number one, Ms.  
16 Raganelli, thank you for reading my letter.

17 why did you never acknowledge the fact  
18 that you even received it? That's the first  
19 question. Is that the normal course of business?

20 MS. RAGANELLI: It is in the context  
21 of -- go ahead.

22 MS. CAREY: Mr. Roman, I understand  
23 that concern, but can you focus on the substance of  
24 the regulation so that we can work on the  
25 regulation?

1 MR. ROMAN: Well, I was starting to do  
2 that when she interrupted me.

3 MS. CAREY: All right.

4 MR. ROMAN: Let me go back.

5 MS. CAREY: Please continue.

6 MR. ROMAN: Let me go back.

7 Item Number 1 has to do with the  
8 definition, okay? I understand that you wanted to  
9 use the term Agency, which is in 26:3 or wherever it  
10 is as opposed to the Local Board of Health  
11 definition.

12 Did you include the definition of a  
13 Local Health Agency in the revision?

14 MS. RAGANELLI: I didn't need to  
15 because it was already there. The definition of  
16 Local Health Agency appears in the Notice of  
17 Proposal at 1.3 under (1) as Local Health Agency,  
18 and I am trying to lay my hands on it as we speak so  
19 I can read you the exact terminology.

20 MR. ROMAN: Okay. All right.

21 Number two, you said that the thing  
22 was deleted, the definition of the Local Health  
23 Department, meaning you said that it was all in  
24 parenthesis and was deleted; is that correct?

25 I'm getting confused. Was it deleted

1 or was it something in parenthesis that didn't  
2 matter?

3 MS. RAGANELLI: When we have existing  
4 text that we're trying to show the Office of  
5 Administrative Law that something is being added or  
6 deleted. If it appears in bold face, it means it's  
7 being added to the text, and if it's in brackets, it  
8 means it's deleted.

9 The term Local Health -- this was in  
10 brackets.

11 So first to go back to your first  
12 question, on page 156, approximately, of the  
13 proposal we defined the term Local Health Agency  
14 means Local Health Agency as N.J.S.A. 26:2(f)-3  
15 defines that term.

16 The page that you were -- you didn't  
17 refer to a page in yours but you just -- there's no  
18 definition of Local Board of Health.

19 And then if I go to page 156 -- excuse  
20 me -- at the bottom of page 155, there was an  
21 existing definition of the term Local Health  
22 Department means the Board of Health of a region or  
23 municipality. That text was marked for deletion,  
24 has the bracket at the end of that paragraph. So  
25 that --

1 MR. ROMAN: So that was taken out.

2 MS. RAGANELLI: -- was marked for  
3 deletion.

4 That was never there to begin with.  
5 It was in the text that we sent you originally that  
6 you had before you, that was shown in bracketed  
7 text, but you misread it as meaning I was adding it  
8 to define Local Health Department to mean a Board of  
9 Health.

10 MR. ROMAN: Okay. I apologize. I did  
11 misread it. I did misread it. Sorry.

12 MS. RAGANELLI: And I had said at the  
13 time, it's a long document and it's a lot of text  
14 and we -- and I acknowledged it at the time. It's  
15 not your fault. It's a texty document. It's a  
16 document full of text.

17 MR. ROMAN: Let's go down to 4 and 5.

18 Number 4 has to do with deleting the  
19 reference to Appendix B and replacing it with a  
20 reference to Appendix R and using the proper title.

21 Is that something that was changed or  
22 did I misread?

23 MS. RAGANELLI: You misread, sir.

24 MR. ROMAN: Okay. And finally --

25 MS. RAGANELLI: With respect I'm

1 saying that.

2 MR. ROMAN: -- the last one you said  
3 -- you referred the last one to OEMS?

4 MS. RAGANELLI: Yes, sir.

5 MR. ROMAN: Did they ever respond?

6 MS. RAGANELLI: Not yet, but I believe  
7 -- no, sir. Believe me, sir, you can imagine we  
8 received 2,800 comments on this proposal.

9 MR. ROMAN: well, they're shorthanded,  
10 too. I'm familiar with that.

11 MS. RAGANELLI: So it's certainly not  
12 a marked disrespect to your comment, sir.

13 MR. ROMAN: Okay.

14 MS. RAGANELLI: And at that time I had  
15 said to you -- and at the time I had said to you  
16 that use of universal precautions is basic training  
17 for an EMT, and so it may have been that they felt  
18 that that -- that'd be nice to have but perhaps  
19 extraneous to requirements.

20 MR. ROMAN: Okay, but you did submit  
21 it to OEMS. Thank you for doing that.

22 MS. RAGANELLI: Yes, sir.

23 MR. ROMAN: That concludes my notes.

24 MS. CAREY: All right. Do we have any  
25 other questions or comments from the council

1 members?

2 All right. At this point, we are  
3 entering a public comment period, I should say the  
4 public comment period for this meeting.

5 And DOH staff, please verify that I'm  
6 saying this correctly, that individuals who wish to  
7 speak, if you are on Teams, you can raise your hand.  
8 If you are on the phone, we will have to -- we will  
9 have to call you in the best order possible.

10 You need to state your name, where you  
11 are from and you have a two-minute limit, and your  
12 comments are addressed to the chair.

13 This is not a question-and-answer  
14 session for health department staff. These are  
15 questions, these are comments directed to the chair  
16 of the Public Health Council that we will compile  
17 and refer to appropriate staff.

18 MR. ROMAN: Madam chair, are you  
19 opening to the public before we vote?

20 MS. CAREY: That is the point of  
21 order. The public comment is for the Public Health  
22 Council overall or as a -- or for comments directed  
23 to the matter at hand.

24 The serious answer is that the public  
25 comment period for this regulation has already been

1 closed.

2 MR. ROMAN: Right.

3 MS. CAREY: So therefore, yes, thank  
4 you for that point of order, Mr. Roman. We do have  
5 a vote based -- and just for the record, those  
6 collected comments have been shared with the council  
7 members for review from the public comment period.

8 So again, point of order. We will  
9 first take the members' votes on support for  
10 adoption of the N.J.A.C. 8:57 and then open the  
11 meeting to public comment to collect questions of  
12 public health directed to the chair.

13 MR. ROMAN: I will move that the  
14 N.J.A.C. 8:57 as presented to the council be  
15 recommended for approval. That's it.

16 MS. CAREY: And do I have a second for  
17 that?

18 DR. WEBB: Suffiyah webb, I second.

19 MS. CAREY: Thank you, Dr. Webb.

20 May I have a roll call, Ms. Pressley.

21 MS. PRESSLEY: Absolutely.

22 Ms. Stephanie Carey.

23 MS. CAREY: Yes.

24 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Paul Roman.

25 MR. ROMAN: Yes.

1 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Michael Gross.

2 Mickey Gross.

3 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Denay, he said that  
4 because you muted him he is not able to unmute  
5 himself.

6 MS. PRESSLEY: I never muted him. No,  
7 I never muted him.

8 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Mickey, are you  
9 able to raise your hand so we can see which phone  
10 number is yours?

11 MS. PRESSLEY: while we're waiting,  
12 Dr. Suffiyah webb. Dr. Suffiyah webb.

13 Mickey Gross.

14 I'm not sure, Chair. Do you want to  
15 circle back?

16 DR. SAHU: We have to unmute the phone  
17 number for Mickey Gross.

18 Paul, do you know what Mickey Gross's  
19 phone number is.

20 MR. ROMAN: I can get it. Hold on.

21 Yes, I have it here. Try

22 (732) 433-0603. Try that one first.

23 (Discussion off the record.)

24 DR. WEBB: Sorry. My phone died.

25 It's Dr. Webb.

1 MS. PRESSLEY: It's okay. Thank you.  
2 We were voting.

3 Chair, did you want to go again just  
4 to bring Dr. Webb up to speed? We were voting.

5 I don't see Mickey's number. Maybe we  
6 can ask him to raise his hand because I'm not seeing  
7 the number.

8 MR. ROMAN: I'll give you one more to  
9 try.

10 (Discussion off the record.)

11 MS. PRESSLEY: Actually, I apologize.  
12 There's a lot of numbers here.

13 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Why don't we do  
14 this, because it seems like he's having some  
15 technical difficulty. Why don't you mute yourself,  
16 see if you can give him a call and see if he's  
17 having some technical issues then we can start the  
18 vote over.

19 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

20 So thank you for your patience as we  
21 work through technical issues. Specifically that  
22 adoption recommendation and presentation to the  
23 Public Health Council is a separate process provided  
24 to this advisory council and is separate from the  
25 public rule making period that has already been held

1 and, as was referenced, had some 2,000 comments  
2 provided.

3 The purpose of the public comment  
4 period in this meeting is to gather community  
5 concerns addressed to the Public Health Council but  
6 then we can share in our advisory role with the  
7 Department of Health and the commissioner's office.

8 So that said, if you would like to  
9 speak, you may raise your hand. You have two  
10 minutes, up to two minutes, and you state your name  
11 and where you are from.

12 And I am seeing a number of hands  
13 being raised so we will proceed in the order that I  
14 am seeing them on the participants.

15 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Chair, if we could,  
16 let's wait until we can get Mickey back on or -- if  
17 he's not currently on. I want to make sure that we  
18 resolve the issue with the vote before we move  
19 forward, okay? We can just hang tight for a couple  
20 minutes if that's all right.

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Sounds to me  
22 like you're wasting a lot of time. If all we're  
23 going to do is make comments, why don't you just let  
24 us comment?

25 MS. RAGANELLI: We're in the middle of

1 a vote here.

2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Do we really  
3 want to hear from the people or no? We really don't  
4 want to hear what people say. If we're voting, you  
5 should hear the comments before you vote.

6 MR. ROMAN: That's not proper  
7 procedure.

8 MS. CAREY: In response to these  
9 concerns that I am hearing, I remind you that the  
10 public comment period for the regulation has been  
11 held and that this is an opportunity to bring  
12 general community concerns to the Public Health  
13 Council which is separate from -- we are not having  
14 a public hearing on N.J.A.C. 8:57.

15 MS. PRESSLEY: Paul, can you give me  
16 that one number again?

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: How long are we  
18 going to wait for the phone call?

19 Stop muting me.

20 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Chair, just give me  
21 two minutes to see if there's another option. Just  
22 hold tight.

23 (Discussion off the record.)

24 MS. CAREY: Thank you to your  
25 patience. They are attempting to reestablish the

1 connection for the board member.

2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: This is pretty  
3 disrespectful for everyone who's sitting here  
4 waiting to comment, quite honestly. People that  
5 took time out of their schedules, something in the  
6 middle of the day. People do have jobs. This is  
7 really disrespectful.

8 I really don't think you want to hear  
9 the comments because you have everyone just sitting  
10 here. How do you think people feel showing up,  
11 wanting to comment and now we're just sitting,  
12 waiting around for someone who's a board member but  
13 you can't get in touch with him. Is this like the  
14 first virtual meeting ever? Disrespectful.

15 MS. CAREY: I am pausing based on  
16 recommendation of counsel.

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: This is  
18 actually weird. I don't know. I've been in a lot  
19 of, like, virtual hearings. I've never been in one  
20 with you all before, and I will say, is this normal  
21 procedure?

22 This is odd. I've never seen, like, a  
23 committee chase down a member that didn't show up or  
24 showed up and got disconnected, and I had asked in  
25 the chat are you all able to vote without this

1 person? Are you missing the number of votes? Why  
2 are we being placed on hold so long for this one  
3 member?

4 MR. ROMAN: Stephanie, did Dr. Webb  
5 vote?

6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: What a great  
7 question, Donna. Thank you very much.

8 DR. WEBB: This is Dr. Webb here. My  
9 vote is yes.

10 MR. ROMAN: Okay. Hold on. Hold on.

11 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I would also  
12 like to know, is this being recorded?

13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No, no answer?  
14 No one will answer me if this is being recorded?  
15 It's public so it should be recorded.

16 MR. ROMAN: Hold on. Stay on the  
17 phone with me, okay? Mickey, hold on. Hold on.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Doesn't this  
19 actually require a public hearing?

20 MR. ROMAN: Communicable disease  
21 regulation forward for adoption. Are you voting?  
22 Okay. Hold on.

23 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Why are people  
24 being muted, too? That's my question.

25 MR. ROMAN: Stephanie, Stephanie, you

1 there?

2 MS. CAREY: Yes.

3 MR. ROMAN: Yeah. I got Mickey on the  
4 phone.

5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm not even  
6 here for this reason. I'm here for whole 'nother  
7 reason, but I don't think that you guys can accept  
8 that vote.

9 MR. ROMAN: Steph, I have --

10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: They're muting  
11 you, Donna. I'm not even here for this issue. I  
12 mean, this is wrong. The folks who are fighting on  
13 this --

14 MR. ROMAN: Ma'am, I'm trying to talk  
15 to my chairman.

16 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: This is odd.  
17 Something's wrong.

18 MS. CAREY: Ms. D'Allesandro, are you  
19 there?

20 MR. ROMAN: Jackie, are you there?

21 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Just give us two  
22 more minutes, guys. Thank you.

23 MS. CAREY: Mickey, can you mute  
24 yourself until you get this resolved?

25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: This is fucking

1 crazy.

2 MS. CAREY: I appreciate people's  
3 patience. I am on hold pending legal determination.

4 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Stephanie, when  
5 will we be able to find the recording and  
6 transcription following this meeting just so we can  
7 share it out further? where would we be able to  
8 find that?

9 MS. CAREY: The minutes of the meeting  
10 will be posted at the Public Health Council web  
11 page.

12 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: How about the  
13 recording and the transcription?

14 MS. CAREY: The minutes are the  
15 transcription. I don't have the information at my  
16 fingertips about the recording.

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. The New  
18 Jersey public deserves to have access to this. This  
19 meeting is done for and in service of their needs so  
20 we need to make sure that this is available, just  
21 like a school board meeting, just like any other  
22 meeting.

23 MS. CAREY: Okay. Thank you.

24 MS. PRESSLEY: I understand the  
25 frustration. If you can just give us a few minutes,

1 and I truly apologize. I understand we've already  
2 asked and you've given us a couple of minutes. If  
3 you can give us two more minutes to be patient with  
4 us and we're trying to get some things squared away,  
5 okay? Truly apologize. Thank you.

6 MR. ROMAN: Ms. Pressley, I spoke with  
7 Mickey and he's trying to get back in.

8 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. I'll let him in  
9 as soon as he come back in. Thank you, Paul.

10 (Discussion off the record.)

11 MR. ROMAN: Denay?

12 MS. PRESSLEY: I'm here, Paul.

13 MR. ROMAN: He says he tried to call  
14 in twice and you kept muting him. He's trying  
15 again.

16 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay.

17 MR. ROMAN: I don't know what's going  
18 on.

19 MS. PRESSLEY: Okay. Not a problem.  
20 Thank you, Paul.

21 MR. GROSS: Hello. This is Mickey  
22 Gross. This system is a disaster. I had to pull  
23 over the side of the road.

24 MS. PRESSLEY: We're going to go back  
25 to the voting. I'm going to do the roll call vote.

1 MR. GROSS: I'm doing everything in my  
2 power to help.

3 MS. PRESSLEY: Ms. Stephanie Carey.

4 MS. CAREY: Yes.

5 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Denay, just hold  
6 off, okay? I'll be back on with some instructions  
7 in just a minute. Thanks.

8 MS. CAREY: We will rewind when this  
9 gets -- when this -- when the attorney gives us the  
10 information to proceed.

11 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Why aren't we  
12 adjourning and postponing this? What's the reason  
13 for that?

14 MS. CAREY: I am awaiting attorney's  
15 advice.

16 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You have people  
17 voting who have not been in the full meeting. So  
18 how is that according to policy? How is that  
19 according to policy? They have not been present for  
20 the whole meeting. They missed the beginning of the  
21 meeting. How are you --

22 MR. GROSS: Excuse me. I was on the  
23 beginning of the meeting and I was muted so who's  
24 making these comments?

25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: The public is

1 making the comments because the public deserves the  
2 respect of full time and attention of all members in  
3 the meeting.

4 MR. GROSS: If you listen, I was on  
5 the call for the attendance and then I was muted,  
6 and I heard a good part of the meeting, all right?

7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: A good part but  
8 not the whole thing.

9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Not the whole  
10 thing.

11 MR. GROSS: I'll tell you what. You  
12 people tell me if I need to vote or not vote, but  
13 this is nonsense, all right?

14 MS. CAREY: Point of order, we are not  
15 in the public comment period at this time and we  
16 are --

17 MR. GROSS: Well, then mute her.

18 MS. CAREY: -- we are on hold  
19 regarding recommendations about N.J.A.C. 8:57.

20 MR. GROSS: We gotta come up with a  
21 better system, guys, with this phone stuff. I'm  
22 telling you.

23 MR. ROMAN: Mickey, hang on, okay?

24 MS. PRESSLEY: Can we all just, like,  
25 have a little bit more patience? I truly understand

1 that it's been --

2 MR. GROSS: No, I get it. I get it.  
3 I mean, I pulled over to the side of the road. I'm  
4 sitting here in the lobby of some restaurant.

5 MS. PRESSLEY: We truly appreciate  
6 everybody's patience during this time. Thank you.

7 MS. CAREY: Based on the technical  
8 issues and on the keen interest in this topic, we  
9 are going to adjourn the meeting for today. I  
10 should say I will request -- I will request --

11 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm sorry --

12 MS. CAREY: -- adjourn the meeting.

13 MS. PRESSLEY: Stephanie, I was  
14 advised --

15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I have been on  
16 this call for another issue. You cannot adjourn  
17 this meeting.

18 MS. PRESSLEY: Stephanie, I was  
19 advised to adjourn the meeting. I'm going to do a  
20 roll call.

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No. You guys  
22 should have adjourned the meeting a long time ago.  
23 How dare you --

24 MS. PRESSLEY: Stephanie, I'm going to  
25 do a roll call.

1 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Excuse me. I thank  
2 everybody for their patience.

3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We are not all  
4 here for this issue. I understand you all --

5 MR. GROSS: I was muted. I could not  
6 speak. I could not speak. So what do you want me  
7 to do, fight with the phone company? They muted me,  
8 or somebody muted me.

9 MS. CAREY: So based on attorney  
10 recommendation and on --

11 MR. GROSS: That's fine.

12 MS. CAREY: -- the situation we are  
13 seeing here, because of the issues with this meeting  
14 --

15 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Steph, Steph. I'm  
16 sorry, Steph. I did not realize that Mickey had  
17 joined us again.

18 Since we have reestablished a quorum,  
19 we should move forward with the vote at this time.  
20 So if you could take a roll call vote and then we  
21 can move past that to the public comment.

22 MR. GROSS: Mickey was only off for a  
23 little period of time. Mickey was only off for a  
24 period of time. I was muted. I just can't talk.

25 MR. ROMAN: Mickey, hold on.

1 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: I need everybody to  
2 take a beat. We have reestablished a quorum.

3 So Chair, if you would, I would like  
4 to redo the roll call vote at this time.

5 MR. GROSS: That works for me.

6 MS. CAREY: For the record, could you  
7 state your name for the record, please.

8 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: My name is Deputy  
9 Attorney General Jacqueline D'Alessandro.

10 We are going to redo the roll call  
11 vote. We've already had a motion and a second to  
12 recommend adoption of N.J.A.C. 8:57. So at this  
13 time what we are doing is picking up with the roll  
14 call vote that was paused a short time ago.

15 So Chair, I will let you take it from  
16 there, or Denay, rather, to call the roll call vote  
17 and then we can move on to the public comment  
18 portion, and I thank everyone for their patience.

19 MS. PRESSLEY: Ms. Stephanie Carey.

20 MS. CAREY: Yes.

21 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Paul Roman.

22 MR. ROMAN: Yes.

23 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Mickey Gross.

24 MR. GROSS: Yes.

25 MS. PRESSLEY: Dr. Suffiyah Webb.

1 DR. WEBB: Yes.

2 MS. PRESSLEY: We have four yeses.

3 Motion carries.

4 Please proceed, chair. Thank you.

5 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

6 I appreciate people's desire to have  
7 additional comment period. We are now entering the  
8 public comment period for the Public Health Council  
9 overall and to collect community feedback.

10 I specifically note that -- I  
11 specifically note that Ms. Dennis has her hand  
12 raised and she was the initial person to raise her  
13 hand so I will call on Ms. Dennis for her comments.  
14 Two minutes.

15 Please state your name and where you  
16 are from.

17 MS. DENNIS: Thank you. My name is  
18 Danna Dennis. I'm the executive director of an  
19 organization that is New Jersey based. It's a  
20 nonprofit called Sensory-Safe Cuts.

21 Our mission is to make grooming spaces  
22 more inclusive across the state for neurodivergent  
23 clients, whether they be child or adult,  
24 specifically those who are battling autism and ADHD.

25 Currently in the State of New Jersey,

1 there is no mandated requirement for cosmetologists  
2 or barbers who are working with these clients. To  
3 get your cosmetology license, the state requires  
4 1,200 hours of schooling and two standardized tests.  
5 To get your barber license it is 900 hours.

6 we don't even have one of those hours  
7 requiring that these specialists have to work with  
8 these clients, nor are they provided resources, and  
9 it is our research-determined and also lived  
10 experience across the agency and many of our members  
11 that this is also a statewide health crisis.

12 And so we are aiming to do several  
13 things. Develop a training and licensing technique  
14 that is standardized, equip salons with practical  
15 sensory-friendly tools and practices, connect  
16 families to safe trained professionals who have  
17 these tools, and advocate for inclusion in beauty  
18 and grooming, and cross-grooming education as well.

19 I mean, we're already doing this work.  
20 Our core initiatives require sensory safe  
21 certifications for folks who work with us, sensory  
22 tool kits for salons, and of course, advocacy and  
23 community outreach, and we believe that in terms of  
24 the health crisis, the result when there is lack of  
25 training really, and the communication barriers

1 between the clients and the professionals, often  
2 cause acute anxiety, meltdowns and shutdowns during  
3 haircuts. It also causes families to avoid salons  
4 all together and emotional distress or social  
5 isolation for the client.

6           And why we want to partner with  
7 Department of Health on this matter is because we  
8 believe advancing the health acumen and reducing  
9 disparities is of utmost importance. It reduces  
10 against stress, supports mental health and emotional  
11 regulation and encourages community participation  
12 and social inclusion.

13           It is not our request that all changes  
14 be immediately done as far as regulation on the  
15 state level or any kind of law, but it is our  
16 recommendation that the state legislating body along  
17 with this committee and several others across  
18 several boards at the state level would convene  
19 either a working group or a committee comprised of  
20 health professionals, those with lived experience  
21 who are neurodivergent themselves, family members  
22 and several other professionals working across the  
23 health spectrum to then advise the state legislating  
24 body, and of course the governor, to practices that  
25 could then be made into eventually a law that would

1 require hopefully training hours, resources, and of  
2 course funding dedicated to this concern.

3 Thank you for hearing me.

4 MR. GROSS: Well said.

5 Hello. Hello.

6 MR. ROMAN: Stephanie, you're muted.

7 MS. CAREY: Thank you, Ms. Dennis, and  
8 we'd be interested in getting additional information  
9 from your group. Thank you.

10 All right. Next with raised hands I  
11 see a Julie Shavalier. Ms. Shavalier.

12 MS. SHAVALIER: Yes. Thank you. My  
13 name is Julie Shavalier. I'm an attorney and a mom  
14 to four kids under ten.

15 what I've witnessed today has not only  
16 been unconstitutional, it's been unAmerican. The  
17 entire way that this process has played out has been  
18 unconstitutional and unAmerican.

19 The disdain with which Mr. Paul Roman  
20 has spoken to his colleagues and constituents is  
21 really unfortunate to witness.

22 I practice a lot in New York City and  
23 I lived there with my two young children until 2019  
24 when I fled the state because of the religious  
25 exemption repeal. I've since had two more children

1 in New Jersey, and they're at the only school  
2 they've ever known and have been welcomed with open  
3 arms in spite of our vaccination statuses and  
4 refusal to comply with mandates.

5 I hope that the people who are pushing  
6 this through recognize that this is not popular  
7 public policy, especially since COVID. This is a  
8 different time that even when we stood outside in  
9 Trenton in sub-zero temperatures.

10 Sentiment has changed. People do not  
11 want to be told what to do with their medical  
12 choices. They want to make medical choices for  
13 their children without the inference of governor  
14 mandates -- government mandates, and I hope that you  
15 all will reconsider the way that this is going to be  
16 applied.

17 Sounds very -- it can be very biased  
18 in who will be allowed to get a religious exemption,  
19 and I don't know if you all recall that was how it  
20 was first applied in New York and it was extremely  
21 unfair.

22 I've had a five-page letter written  
23 with a fellow attorney to try to get access to  
24 religious exemption to prove my religious beliefs,  
25 and that is not constitutional.

1 I believe you're going to continue to  
2 drive people out of the state. I'm one of the  
3 highest tax brackets in this state. I spend tens of  
4 thousands of dollars in taxes and I don't even send  
5 my kids to a public school because I don't believe  
6 in the rights that are being stripped from parents.

7 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

8 MS. SHAVALIER: I live in Linden, New  
9 Jersey, and I hope that this is made available to  
10 everyone in the public because this is not right  
11 what happened here today.

12 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

13 Okay. Next in line we have Ann Rosen.

14 MS. ROSEN: Hi. I want to echo some  
15 of the sentiments that I just heard. I feel like  
16 what's happening here is a disgrace, and I've been  
17 attending these meetings for about the past two  
18 years and it's been very similar.

19 so this is -- this is -- this is not  
20 in service to public health. This is in service to  
21 a bigger agenda, and I'm very concerned about what  
22 these rules are going to put through because it puts  
23 the Department of Health really at liberty of  
24 creating narratives between the OPRA exemptions and  
25 the expanded surveillance and the ability of the

1 commissioner to make certain discretionary  
2 decisions.

3 I think we're looking at a  
4 nonaccountability feedback loop that is being set up  
5 here that there's going to be recommendations made  
6 and then recommendations followed. Who is going to  
7 be accountable, particularly with regards to the  
8 northeast public health collaborative which is  
9 inter-jurisdictional between multi states?

10 I mean, I just want to know how these  
11 things are all going to work together. I'm very  
12 curious about what's going to happen with narratives  
13 and how they're going to be used to drive agendas  
14 because it -- now the legislature is stepping back  
15 with some of the bills that have come up. The  
16 department -- there's centralized authority under  
17 the department.

18 This is really problematic. I really  
19 want to know who's going to be accountable for these  
20 decisions ultimately because it seems like there's  
21 going to be a lot of finger pointing and no one  
22 taking responsibility when things go wrong, and I do  
23 anticipate that things will go wrong. Thank you.

24 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

25 MR. GROSS: Hello.

1 MS. CAREY: So let's see. I am  
2 looking in the line of people who are on Teams and  
3 next I see Deana Pagnozzi.

4 MS. PAGNOZZI: After everything we  
5 witnessed -- so Deana Pagnozzi from Colonia, New  
6 Jersey.

7 After everything we witnessed with  
8 COVID, I can't understand how anyone on this panel  
9 thinks it's okay to push even more authority away  
10 from families and in government hands.

11 The issue I struggle with is that no  
12 one in leadership has been courageous enough to  
13 simply reflect and say, we made mistakes. Let's  
14 revisit this and let's talk about it.

15 COVID was a disaster. These proposed  
16 bills do not help the citizens of the state. What  
17 additional protections are you offering? None.  
18 Instead this is a power grab of control and we, the  
19 citizens of this state, deserve better.

20 Parents are and must remain the  
21 primary decision-makers for our children. You do  
22 not own my child. No school, agency or government  
23 department should be making medical or mental health  
24 decisions behind a parent's back.

25 When my kids were in school I had to

1 sign paperwork for failed test assignments,  
2 permission slips for school trips, forms for sports  
3 tryouts and even consent for my child to take  
4 something as simple as Midol, yet now we're talking  
5 about allowing 14-year-olds to seek mental health  
6 treatment without parents' knowledge.

7 why would anyone on this panel think  
8 that this is acceptable? Does this sound like a  
9 government representing its people?

10 If a licensed physician determines  
11 that a patient should be not receive a particular  
12 vaccine, how does it make sense for an unlicensed  
13 official agency to override that medical judgment?  
14 How's this keeping anyone safe?

15 And now, on top of expanding school  
16 control, you want to weaken OPRA requests, the only  
17 transparency, the tool the public has left.

18 so I ask this panel directly, what is  
19 the reasoning behind this removing transparency?  
20 why would withholding information ever be considered  
21 better for the citizens you represent?

22 If your decision is to truly serve the  
23 public then you should be open to public scrutiny.  
24 Transparency builds trust and secrecy destroys it.

25 You believe you know what's best but

1 that's not really the case.

2 My family understands the consequences  
3 of unchecked government power. My mother-in-law  
4 escaped from Cuba. She fled the Castro regime so  
5 her children could have a better life, and it feels  
6 like that's what you're living in right now.

7 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

8 Next on the list of raised hands is  
9 Ariel Mayer.

10 MS. MAYER: Hello, committee. Thank  
11 you for letting me speak. I don't have much to say,  
12 although I have so much to say and two minutes is  
13 too short.

14 There should have been more time given  
15 to the public to know about this meeting. I only  
16 found out about it yesterday. Feel like taking away  
17 the rights of elected officials by the people and  
18 putting it in the hands of government agencies is  
19 against the constitution. It's against our rights  
20 as citizens.

21 I'm going to read from the New Jersey  
22 Constitution, as I've been posting a lot in the  
23 chat, but number 5, no person shall be denied the  
24 enjoyment of any civil or military right nor be  
25 discriminated against in the exercise of any civil

1 or military right nor be segregated from militia or  
2 public schools because of religious principles,  
3 race, color, ancestry or national origin, and I feel  
4 like this is moving towards the language of someone  
5 else making that decision about, like, what's right  
6 for my family; and I am a health care practitioner  
7 and I feel like it's not broad enough who might be  
8 on this committee.

9           It seems like there's certain agencies  
10 that are there and it's not opened up to more -- you  
11 know, I have a master's degree, licensed  
12 acupuncturist and I've served on boards, and you  
13 know, we have a lot of different views when we come  
14 together, and I just feel like this is very  
15 one-sided. It's not opening up to enough different  
16 agencies and groups to have a say in what  
17 constitutes good public health, and I also don't  
18 like the fact that institutions, I think there's  
19 something in here about like colleges and other  
20 institutions having rights that violate HIPAA, which  
21 I can't even violate, so -- you know, with my  
22 patients, and now we're going to open up some sort  
23 of registry.

24           I mean, there's a possibility of  
25 quarantining again, and after we saw with, like,

1 COVID, how many false-positives that there were and  
2 then finding out that, like, people didn't have  
3 anything, and kids in my district were quarantined  
4 just for not testing positive. So if you were  
5 around somebody who did, they actually got to go  
6 back to sooner than somebody who never tested  
7 positive.

8                   So there's a lot of discrepancies  
9 there that were very disturbing so that was a big  
10 thing, and I don't know how much that's talked  
11 about. In my school district, that was quite  
12 upsetting.

13                   MS. CAREY: Thank you.

14                   MS. MAYER: Thank you for letting me  
15 share. There are so many nuances and to move  
16 forward with this, it's just --

17                   MS. CAREY: Thank you.

18                   MS. MAYER: Thank you.

19                   MS. CAREY: Let's see. I do not see  
20 any additional hands up in the room. I just see  
21 another --

22                   MS. PRESSLEY: Excuse me, Chair. I do  
23 see one. Looks like Deana Pagnozzi.

24                   MS. CAREY: She just spoke.

25                   MS. PRESSLEY: No, that was someone

1 else just spoke.

2 MS. CAREY: Yes. And Deana Pagnozzi  
3 also spoke, and I see a new hand raised and then  
4 after that we will proceed to taking comments from  
5 people on the phone.

6 I will ask the people exercise  
7 discretion about taking people in a rational order.

8 Okay. But so Mary Pocsik, please.

9 MS. PACSIK: Hi. Good afternoon. My  
10 name is Mary Pocsik. I am from multiple points in  
11 New Jersey. I own homes in Hoboken, New Jersey,  
12 Westwood, New Jersey, and Lake Hoptacong, New  
13 Jersey.

14 I'm here today to -- and I'm not a  
15 regular attender of these meetings. I, too, found  
16 out about this on very short notice.

17 I also came to learn that a few of the  
18 most recent meetings of this group did not happen,  
19 and clearly at the top of this meeting we saw a lot  
20 of confusion, not only of the call-in, of the  
21 dial-in, of the attendees. We have not gotten clear  
22 answers as to whether or not this meeting would be  
23 transcribed and recorded for public consumption.

24 We know that there are many people who  
25 would not have been able to make this meeting who

1 would find it, I'm sure, very interesting and  
2 enlightening in terms of how this meeting went, sort  
3 of very haphazard, a lot of confusion around  
4 protocols.

5 I think at the end of the day, I  
6 really identified with one of the comments that was  
7 put in the chat which I tried to give voice to  
8 earlier in this meeting, but because I was -- myself  
9 and others were put on mute multiple times, I do  
10 think it's worth bringing attention to the question  
11 as to whether items that were up for vote that had  
12 more than 2,000 comments and no hearing further the  
13 question of whether or not the law requires a public  
14 hearing. The legislative requires the public  
15 hearing before changing sanitary code.

16 So I think it is very important. I'm  
17 not a lawyer myself, but in reviewing of some these  
18 comments I think it's very important that we make  
19 sure that we are not running afoul of meeting  
20 procedure, policies, how meetings should be run,  
21 whether or not a public hearing was warranted in  
22 this case of massive consumer feedback, and so I am  
23 basically here to -- I don't even have children but  
24 I believe in the right to choice. I believe in the  
25 right to bodily autonomy, and I also believe that

1 religious exemption is a key component of being able  
2 to manage the U.S. Constitution and allow freedom of  
3 religion and freedom of choice as it relates to  
4 those religious beliefs. Thank you.

5 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

6 I believe that there are a number of  
7 people who are on the phone. I will do my best to  
8 do this in an orderly manner. There is not a way  
9 for, to the best of my knowledge, individuals to  
10 raise their hand on the phone.

11 I have had a request for five-minute  
12 break. May we take a five-minute break for the  
13 purposes of this meeting's been on for two hours.

14 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Steph, this is DAG  
15 D'Alessandro. You're welcome to take a five-minute  
16 break if you like to, but the member of the public  
17 can also just excuse themselves for a couple  
18 minutes. So whatever you prefer.

19 MS. CAREY: Let us take five minutes  
20 and then I will resume calling people from the  
21 telephone lines, and I have to leave that -- yes.

22 For the record, the court reporter  
23 will be offline for five minutes and then --

24 MS. D'ALESSANDRO: Yes. Apologies.  
25 Sorry, Steph. I did not realize that --

1 MS. CAREY: And then we will return to  
2 take the telephone comments.

3 (Brief recess.)

4 MS. CAREY: Good afternoon.  
5 Reconvening. Verifying the court reporter is back  
6 on. I see Mr. Roman.

7 Do we have Dr. Webb and Mr. Gross  
8 back?

9 DR. WEBB: Yes, I'm here, Suffiyah  
10 webb.

11 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

12 And Mr. Gross, star 6.

13 As stated, I will attempt to collect  
14 comments from people on the phone. Actually what I  
15 will do is I will go through the last two digits of  
16 the phone numbers and ask each person whether they  
17 have a comment.

18 MR. GROSS: Mickey Gross, I'm back on  
19 the call, just so you know. I'm Mickey. I'm back.

20 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

21 MR. GROSS: I don't go away.

22 MS. CAREY: So this is continuing the  
23 public comment section.

24 I will assume that everybody who has  
25 attended this meeting, the Teams, has spoken as

1 using the raise hand feature.

2 At this point, I will call out the  
3 last two digits of people's phone numbers, and if  
4 you have a comment, you get your two minutes. State  
5 your name, where you're from and you get two  
6 minutes, and if you don't just say pass, okay?

7 All right. Starting with phone number  
8 ending in 00. Yes?

9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Can I be heard.

10 MS. CAREY: Yes. State your --

11 MS. PAGNOZZI: How about 1028 mutes  
12 himself? We hear the clicking of his car. He was  
13 muted the whole time.

14 There you go. Beautiful.

15 MS. CAREY: Person whose phone number  
16 ends in 00, please state your name, where you're  
17 from and your two minutes.

18 MR. MORRIS: I'm Ed Morris from  
19 Piscataway, New Jersey. Thank you for your service  
20 and the meeting.

21 I share your concern for public  
22 health. However, COVID, HIV and virology are scams.  
23 Viruses are not contagious or proven to exist.

24 People are being poisoned and killed  
25 by medical treatment and by vaccines, not by

1 viruses.

2 I urge you to read Contagion Myth by  
3 Dr. Tom Cowan, M.D. This is available at the  
4 website virustruth.net, virustruth.net.

5 I also urge you to study the website  
6 rethinkingaids.com, rethinkingaids.com. Thank you.

7 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

8 For the phone number ending in 27.  
9 Phone number ending in 27. Otherwise, I will move  
10 on.

11 Phone number ending in 42. Second  
12 call for phone number ending in 42.

13 Phone number ending in 78.

14 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hi. Sorry.  
15 what's the number?

16 MS. CAREY: Phone number ending in 78.  
17 Last two numbers.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I actually was  
19 offering just a suggestion. Maybe for those who  
20 want to speak who are on phone you ask them to  
21 unmute and then note those numbers somehow and then  
22 pick from there.

23 I don't know how many people are on.  
24 Just an idea.

25 MS. CAREY: Thank you. It is your

1 turn to speak?

2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's fine.

3 I'm going to pass as it turned out, but thank you.

4 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

5 Phone number ending in 86.

6 MS. COCO: Hello.

7 MS. CAREY: Hello, yes. State your  
8 name.

9 MS. COCO: I'm Jessica Coco. I'm with  
10 -- I live in the City of Hoboken and I find it  
11 disgraceful that there were more than 2,600 people  
12 who have responded to this bill and that no one was  
13 heard, and this is, like, not a democracy at all.

14 I mean, after what we saw in 2020,  
15 really, you would think that you would see less of  
16 this kind of tyranny, but instead it seems to be  
17 growing more.

18 That's all I have to say.

19 MS. CAREY: Okay. Thank you.

20 Phone number ending in 99. Phone  
21 number ending in 99.

22 All right. There's a second number  
23 ending in 86, another individual with 86.

24 Phone number ending in 00, an  
25 additional individual with the phone number ending

1 in 00.

2 MS. O'ROURKE: Yes, hello. Can you  
3 hear me?

4 MS. CAREY: Yes.

5 MS. O'ROURKE: Hi. I'm the other 00.

6 MS. CAREY: Okay, great.

7 MS. O'ROURKE: My name is Kim O'Rourke  
8 and I am located in Maywood, New Jersey.

9 I have been fighting this fight. My  
10 children, I have four children of my own and we used  
11 to go to school in New York, and in 2019 my kids  
12 were kicked out of a private school that I paid for  
13 because of the loss of religious exemption and I had  
14 to start them over in New Jersey, which is where I  
15 live, and currently they are in public school and  
16 thriving, and this is very concerning to me how this  
17 was ran, very disorganized, and the need for public  
18 comment is really important and 2,600 voices have  
19 not been heard and this is very concerning to me as  
20 a parent, as someone who's grown and lived in New  
21 Jersey her entire life.

22 COVID really changed a lot for a lot  
23 of people, and medical rights and freedom should be  
24 at the helm of parents, not for other people to  
25 decide what I do with my children.

1 Thank you very much.

2 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

3 Phone number ending in 42. Phone  
4 number ending in 42.

5 Phone number ending in 81. Phone  
6 number ending in 81.

7 Phone number ending in 88. Let's see.  
8 An additional person whose phone number ends in 00.

9 Phone number ending in 16. Phone  
10 number ending in 16.

11 Okay. Phone number ending in 28.  
12 Yes, it's your turn.

13 MR. GROSS: Stephanie, Mickey Gross.  
14 Just real quick. I unmuted myself there.

15 You might want to politely remind the  
16 folks that are calling in that we are an advisory  
17 council to the commissioner. Regardless what our  
18 decisions are, at the end of the day it's entirely  
19 up to the commissioner whether to take our advice or  
20 not. So I want to make that very clear.

21 I know there was a couple attorneys on  
22 the line. What we vote on is not law. It's just  
23 advice given to our best advice given to the  
24 commissioner, and with that said, I'm going to ask  
25 to be muted again, please.

1 MS. CAREY: All right. Thank you.  
2 Phone number ending in 71. Phone  
3 number ending in 71.

4 MS. DUVALL: Hello.

5 MS. CAREY: Hello. Oh, 41, yes. 41,  
6 go ahead.

7 MS. DUVALL: Okay. My name is Crystal  
8 Duvall. I live in Keansburg, New Jersey.

9 I just want to say that I think all of  
10 us should have our right to body autonomy and it is  
11 our God given right, and even if this panel does not  
12 make those choices, they just give advice to  
13 legislators, it's still important because everyone  
14 here voted for it, and I was definitely one of the  
15 2,000 people that had given my opinion in email, and  
16 I just think it's very unfair because it seems like  
17 no one -- the people that are making the rules are  
18 not listening to the people who have to abide by  
19 them.

20 My kids, thank goodness, my oldest is  
21 now graduating from high school this year. However,  
22 we have been using the medical exemption and --  
23 sorry. I'm nervous -- the religious exemption all  
24 these years, and without it I would leave New  
25 Jersey, and I think there are plenty of other people

1 who would.

2 It's already hard enough to live here  
3 with the taxes and everything, and taking away our  
4 rights as parents to decide what's best for our  
5 children is just unAmerican and unfair. Thank you.

6 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

7 Phone number ending in 71.

8 Phone number ending in 05.

9 Phone number ending in 10.

15 MS. NAZARO: Hi. My number ends in

17 MS. CAREY: Excellent. Very good.

18 Hello.

19 MS. NAZARO: Hello. My name is Debbie

20 Nazaro. I'm a school nurse and I'm president-elect

21 of the New Jersey State School Nurse's Association,

22 and I would just hope that when you give your

23 recommendations to the commissioner that you would

24 advise to either have a public hearing or to

25 review -- take the time to review the comments and

1 concerns about the revisions as they stand.

2 I was able to notice that a change has  
3 been made that would affect how school nurses  
4 process religious exemptions for vaccinations and it  
5 would be a pretty big change from how things have  
6 been done for the last few decades.

7 So there's a discrepancy between  
8 preschool religious exemption wording versus K  
9 through 12 wording of a religious exemption, and I  
10 think that it would be best for everyone involved,  
11 the parents and the school nurses and the  
12 government, to keep that the same for all of the  
13 students instead of singling out preschool.

14 And I believe there was one other  
15 thing pertaining to school nursing that had to do  
16 with requiring the weekly reporting into the, I  
17 think it's called the CDR system or the sick system  
18 from an executive order making it a requirement, and  
19 I also believe it would be better to consult with  
20 the school nurses and the health department before  
21 continuing on with that, and I won't go into it here  
22 because of time, but the data itself is being  
23 collected is just not very valid. So I think we can  
24 find better ways to collect accurate, more accurate  
25 data.

1 All right. And thank you for your  
2 time. Okay.

3 MS. CAREY: Thank you very much.  
4 Is there any member of the public that  
5 I have not called on yet?

6 Seeing no further, or hearing no  
7 further comment, at this time I would ask for a  
8 motion to close the public comment period.

9 MR. GROSS: So moved, Paul Roman.

10 MS. CAREY: Thank you, Mr. Roman.  
11 Second.

12 DR. WEBB: Suffiyah webb.

13 MS. CAREY: Thank you, Dr. webb.  
14 Can I have a roll call for that,  
15 please.

16 MS. PRESSLEY: Sure.  
17 Ms. Stephanie Carey.

18 MS. CAREY: Yes.

19 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Paul Roman.

20 MR. ROMAN: Yes.

21 MS. PRESSLEY: Mr. Mickey Gross.

22 MR. GROSS: Yes.

23 Can you hear me?

24 MS. PRESSLEY: Yes. Thank you.

25 And Dr. Suffiyah webb.

1 MR. GROSS: Mute me again.

2 DR. WEBB: Yes.

3 MS. PRESSLEY: Thank you. We have  
4 four yeses. Thank you.

5 MS. CAREY: Thank you.

6 Okay. For my closing comments, I  
7 appreciate that this is an issue of high constituent  
8 concern. I apologize for the technical difficulties  
9 and appreciate your patience in hanging on  
10 throughout this process.

11 The Public Health Council will provide  
12 its best recommendations and wisdom to the officials  
13 through the commissioner's office who are finalizing  
14 these rules, and please know that we serve in the  
15 best interests of public health to the best of our  
16 ability for no financial gain but because we care  
17 about the health of the people of New Jersey, and I  
18 hear -- and what all of us here in this room want is  
19 what's best for the children and families of the  
20 people of New Jersey and we will do everything we  
21 can to protect health and save lives and make New  
22 Jersey the healthiest place it can be.

23 I want to say thank you to everybody.  
24 I want to wish everyone a peaceful holiday season  
25 and a chance to draw bonds with your fellow human
