MS. JENKINS: I have a quick update on H5N1, the avian influenza. The New Jersey Health One Task Force, that's overseen by the Department of Agriculture but it's in collaboration with the Department of Health and Environmental Protection and it was created to collaborate among the agencies on issues such as zoonotic diseases, vector-borne diseases, food safety, environmental contaminations and things of that nature. For H5N1, the bird flu, it spans all of these agencies.

So the task force is currently doing ongoing surveillance for avian influenza to see what can be done about it, you know, for recommendations on it, but specific for health our communicable disease services is working closely with our state and federal partners to monitor the current situation for the bird flu.

Currently it's important to know that there are no confirmed human cases in New Jersey.

And just some tips to reduce the risk of exposure to bird flu, to obviously avoid contact with any dead birds. If you see dead birds it's recommended that you contact DEP.

1 Also, just to avoid any contact with 2 general wild birds as well such as geese, only 3 eat or drink milk or diary products that have 4 been pasteurized and cook poultry, eggs, and 5 beef to the appropriate internal temperatures 6 before you eat them and our website we have a 7 lot of information, the Department of Health's 8 website on bird flu and other information that 9 you may need about it. 10 That's the update for today. 11 MR. BAKER: Any questions for 12 Ms. Jenkins? I have sort of an odd one. the feds decide that the treatment for bird flu 13 14 in chicken farms is to let it burn through the 15 population, do we have control over that or is 16 that a federal issue? 17 MS. JENKINS: Yeah, I don't really know, 18 we are looking at that. I did see that, 19 that that's one of the recommendations, if you 20 will. But, yeah, that's something we're 21 closely looking at to see what we can and can't 22 do. 23 Okay. Thank you. MR. BAKER: Next,

So my name is Noah Glyn. It's great to be back with the board today two months in a row. I'm here to present the notice of readoption of the hospital financial reporting rules under N.J.A.C. 8:31B.

So these rules establish the financial reporting and monitoring framework for hospitals in New Jersey. These rules ensure that healthcare services are provided with transparency and financial reporting and they support the Health Care Facilities Planning Act and govern financial oversight, uniform billing, and reporting requirements for hospitals. It also has rules regarding the two hospital assessments.

Now, the significance of this readoption would be that we would ensure the continuity and financial oversight transparency in hospital operations as well as equitable distribution of healthcare funding across the state. The regulation's safeguard public interest by ensuring that hospitals remain financially accountable while delivering high-quality care.

in effect since 1973 and it's meant to allow aging in place in a home-like setting for frail, elderly, and disabled persons.

8:36 permits the department to oversee the operations of these facilities through licensure, survey, inspections and enforcement actions.

It doesn't seem like it was 2021 but we readopted the entire chapter in 2021 with technical changes and then updated it in 2024 with social isolation changes and that was as a result of the COVID-19 statute, so the current chapter is set to expire in 2028.

And by way of history, the deemed status program, basically we started with an advanced standing pilot program which was in place since 2012 and it permitted a facility license under this chapter the opportunity to be granted advanced standing through inspections that were performed by a New Jersey trade association in collaboration with the department.

The department after several years decided to move away from the trade association and we decided to move to the deemed status program which essentially took place on

1 November 1st, 2023.

Deemed status also allows the department to review certain documents submitted by the facility in place of the department determining a facility's compliance through a department survey staff.

Deemed status is entirely voluntary and if an ALR determines to apply for deemed status it must submit a request in writing along with a two-year accrediting body report and a remediation plan if one exists.

The department can grant or deny the request which can be revoked or modified in the future. The facility must supply updated documents every two years and notice to the industry was sent out in April of 2023 advising them that the department is going to replace the advanced standing program with the deemed status program. Again, it was effective November 1st, 2023. So, as such, the facilities are aware of this change.

The amendments to 8:36 include the addition of definitions for deemed status and recognized accrediting organization at 8:36-1.3 and at 2.4 we added language to explain the

procedures a facility would need to follow in order to request deemed status.

The notice of proposal was published in the register in April of 2024. The public comment period ended in May 2024, May 31st.

The department received comments from ten individuals who raised various issues such as the cost of the program, the standards of the program, and the fact that it's important for the department's surveyors to also perform inspections of the deemed status facilities.

There was also a comment about the characterization of the event standing program.

But, again, the department acknowledges that was a collaborative effort.

The department thanks each of the commentators and after reviewing the comments the department has decided to adopt the deemed status program as proposed making no changes and I'm here to ask the board to approve the notice of adoption.

A petition of rulemaking was filed by Theresa Edelstein with the New Jersey Hospital Association. The petition requested that the department amend N.J.A.C. 8:39-43.10(n) to mirror the nurse aide competency evaluator requirements that the Centers of Medicare and Medicaid Services established which are set forth at 42 CFR 483.154 C42.

The notice of receipt was published on February 6th, 2023 at 55 N.J.R. 219(a). A notice of action was published on May 20th, 2024 at 55 N.J.R. 923(b) stating that the department planned on granting this petition.

Today's meeting addresses the notice of proposal specifically which contains the department's proposed changes to 8:39-43.10(n). The department proposes to amend subsection N to closely follow the federal regulations which can be found, again, at 42 CFR section 483.154 C42, nurse aide competency evaluation program.

The changes would require each nurse aide training program evaluator to possess at least one year of full-time or full-time equivalent experience as a registered professional nurse providing care for the

Licensing. I'm here today to present the

notice of proposal for explicit and implicit

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bias training. This proposal affects birth
centers and hospitals licensed by the
department pursuant to the Healthcare
Facilities Planning Act and the regulations
affected are found in N.J.A.C. 8:43A, 8:43E,
and 8:43G.

By way of background, on May 11th, 2021 Governor Phil Murphy approved public law 2021 chapter 79, an act concerning bias training which was codified in part at N.J.S.A. 26:2H-12.108 and that was effective November 1st, 2021.

The act requires birthing centers and hospitals providing inpatient maternity services to implement an explicit and implicit bias training program for healthcare professionals who provide perinatal treatment and care to pregnant persons at a hospital or birthing center and for all supportive staff members who interact with pregnant persons at a hospital or birthing center.

The act also requires hospital and birthing centers to ensure that the program is structured in a manner that permits healthcare professionals to be eligible to receive

continuing education credits for participation in the program and identifies the topics that the training program is to address.

The act also directs the department to identify a training tool that hospitals and birthing centers already use while also permitting hospitals and birthing centers to use supplemental customized training tools in providing --

CERTO: To implement the statute the department proposes new rules at N.J.A.C. 8:43A, manual of standards for licensing of ambulatory care facilities, subchapter 28 which is birth centers, and N.J.A.C. 8:43G which is hospital licensing standards at subchapter 19 obstetrics to outline the requirements.

The new rules identify personnel who must complete the training and contains definitions that are in the statute, requires facilities to develop written policies and procedures for the program, identify the training tool approved by the department and how it can be accessed, provide continuing

education credit for course completion for eligible healthcare professionals, identify the time frames for course completion, require that a certificate of completion be issued to all participants, allow completion of outside professional continuing education courses which are covering the same material to be substituted for the training, require completion records be maintained by the facilities and identify required reporting to the department and procedures for audits.

The department also proposes amendments to N.J.A.C. 8:43E which is general licensure procedures and standards which are applicable to all licensed facilities. In subchapter three, enforcement remedies, this amendment would establish a civil monetary penalty of up to \$1,000 per day which is assessable for each day of noncompliance. That's per the statute.
